

Medical Transcription for Dummies by Anne Martinez is an introduction to the profession of medical transcription. It is not a book that will teach the reader how to do medical transcription but it does explain the potential and problems of choosing medical transcription as a career. There is no sugar-coating and Martinez pulls no punches. Although no certification is required for medical

transcription, training is essential and, with so many courses saying you can learn how from home in only a few weeks, she assures the reader that it will take at least nine months or longer to learn. She also removes some of the concerns regarding the viability of medical transcription. With outsourcing and electronic health records not to mention speech recognition technology, there are questions about whether this profession is a good choice. Martinez clearly argues that it is and why she believes this. She also describes the soft-skills a medical transcriptionist ought to have so that the reader can make a more educated decision not based solely on professional expectations but realistic personality traits needed to succeed. As with all Dummies books, there is a lot of basic information, enough to ensure readers get a good overview of the subject. For anyone who is considering becoming a medical transcriptionist, this book is a great resource, one that will help the reader make a career/professional decision. I especially appreciated her honesty regarding online training not taking a mere few months when it realistically takes much longer. I went to a career conference where a certain online course said that anyone can easily learn medical transcription online and a fast typist could do it in four months or fewer.

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
